'Under the Spotlight': Anna Crichton – Scrivener



Anna will return after a few months' absence, after she has Scrivener had her wrist badly broken and needed some serious medical attention. She'll present a brief outline of 'Scrivener' a software package specifically designed for writers. Any writers: novellists, script writers, non-fiction,

short stories, academic papers, journalists,... in other words: YOU.

Last month: CJ Barnes – Script writing

So, you have written that modern version of Game of Thrones, and you want to see it on the big screen, or converted into the next unmissable TV series on Netflix? Think again. For every minute of the movie, you get just one page of script. CJ quoted famous screen script writer Nicolas Myer (Star Trek, Time after Time, The Day After etc): "The screen play is NOT the finished product". It is a blue print for a movie. There are five major differences:

- 1. It is 'Out of Mind': You can't narrate, Directors, actors all have their own feelings.
- 2. You are seen, not heard
- 3. Time is of the essence: some 50 pages of your novel need to be compressed into about 2 minutes. 50 pages in two minutes?? So, next time you read a novel, then watch the movie, try to correlate the two!
- 4. Less is always more: Every character, every place, every word must serve to enrich the story.
- 5. It takes a village after writing the script, there is a huge team of people to make it all come together. And don't forget: In a screen play, every character, every place, every word serves to INCREASE THE BUDGET.

Ah, some subjects are easier to describe than script writing. And therein lies the very concept: How can I compress a professional's one-hour presentation into a 200 word newsletter article that is still informational? Sorry peeps, you should have been there!

Last month's Spotlight speaker: Kathy Shanks

"Authors want to make money. I teach them how to make it." Well, here is a business slogan if ever I heard one! (And let me assure you, during some 40-odd years in business, I've seen a few...).

Kathy, herself an author with over 12 published titles, mentors around 100 clients to help them to make the best from their labour. Her company, Turtle Publishing https://turtlepublishing.com.au/ offers a wide variety of services dealing with all aspects of becoming a successful author.

Kathy's presentation dealt with just one segment: **Self Publishing**. She offers a detailed, step-by-step program 'Publish with Purpose' to follow, comprising of five principal steps. Her presentation also dealt with five principal steps:

- 1. Create quality book
- 2. Optimize everything not just about the metadata
- 3. Book launch strategy
- 4. Social proof reviews
- 5. Improve with advertising keywords, SEO, find searchable keywords etc

You can get a detailed guide 'There is a cornucopia of really good stuff on the <u>Turtle</u> <u>Publishing website</u>. Check it out! Kathy is also the organiser of the annual <u>Logan Bookfest</u>. This is not just for book lovers, **this is for authors**!
