Last month's guest speaker: Ken Vernon



Some people have an almost unfairly eventful life. Visualise: born and bred in Australia, in 1970 Ken shot off to Africa on a stopover on a surfing holiday to Europe, then buys a motorcycle and rides back down Africa to South Africa. He ended up becoming a journalist in South Africa, covering for some 30 years the various wars in Angola, Namibia, the upheavals of changing from apartheid to independence in 1990, to Nelson Mandela's ascension from prison to government in 1994.

Ken lamented that, fiction is hard for him: "Because I'm a journalist, I'm anchored on facts" he said. The guts of his message is that to be successful, most authors need to have a core market - he calls it a niche market. "My first book was about an expedition to Mt Everest in 1996 I covered as a journalist which was very controversial. It was o nly after I wrote the book I serendipitously discovered that Everest was quite a big niche market" he said.

His book 'Everest'96' a story of the deadliest year in the history of climbing mt Everest, focuses on the worst of the Everest mountaineers: a man who turned out to be a charlatan and a conman.

Ken says books about Mt Everest are a good example of a niche market: "in the USA there are 250,000 people who will buy anything to do with climbing Mt Everest" he said. And here is a top-notch tip for you: did you know about Amazon's kindle unlimited? People pay per page. Yes, per page. Click on this link.

Referring to one of his other books 'Last Shots of the Cold War' Ken said he thought it had disappointing results because the book does not fall easily into a niche. Ken intends to relaunch it, changing the title from "Last Shots of the Cold War" to "Last Shots of the First Cold War (referencing the current Russia – China versus the Western world situation). "the title is good, the cover is good, the content is good - now I just need to find the right niche in which to market the book" he says.

Why you should have been there yourself:

Megan Norris will have a new book 'Look What You Made Me Do', a story about "the evil inflicted by vengeful fathers who have killed their own children simply to punish partners".
