This month's speakers: Kellie Cox and Lily Arthur

This month will be with a psychological flavour. Those members who have been with the group for a while, would have met **Lily Arthur** (picture right) several times. Last year, Lily published her '<u>Dirty</u> <u>Laundry</u>' book. It outlines the story of her decades long battle with the authorities who, immediately upon her giving birth, took her son away. Her subject will be 'The Power of the Written Word'.





Kellie Cox, who joined our group a few months ago, has qualifications in psychology, writes fiction about the human condition and

vulnerability of the psyche. And she runs a publishing and production company, she is a therapist, clinical trainer. (Ask her what she does in her spare time...) Her subject will be 'Using Psychology in Your Writing'.

In between, the usual member's contributions, outlining what we have done, and we'll read (or sing...) our parodies, spoofs, poems (those

who did submit something – so far: none!). Yes, remember: it's different this month. Based on any subject, deployed in any type of poetry. More below.

Last month's speaker: Livia York, Stacey King

"I've done everything: from dress maker to mechanic..." was Livia's opening remark. Wasn't that a meeting with a difference we had at Helensvale Writers Group yesterday? And we provided all the entertainment ourselves! The main theme of the morning: **Poetry**.

To start with, Livia gave a sometimes quite emotional presentation of some poems she had written and published herself. "I woke up one morning, just one word on my mind, and within 30 minutes I wrote a poem..." she said. [*Me too, I woke up one morning with the idea of writing a poem, then after hammering my keyboard for 30 HOURS, it was still*

One of the places you really need to get familiar with: **Vocal Media**. Note: the link is <u>https://vocal.media/</u> (NOT vocal.com). There you'll find well over a dozen posts from her. But the major attraction of this organisation is that **you get paid per read**. Come on! Click on the link and check it out, then go and register. If you click on 'Learn more...' on the home page, there is a whole tutorial behind it.

Why you all should have been there yourselves:

In addition to our two main speakers, we enjoyed those poets among us (that is those who did submit one) recite their work. Great fun and emotions! No, I didn't take a video recording. You should have been there yourself, indeed! Ralph Mayn, with his work titled 'Alice' scored the bottle of Shiraz. Last month, on 20th October, I sent out a PDF with all the poems that were submitted. Drop me a line if you didn't get it or want a copy.

This month's competition: Parody, Spoof, Satire:
