This month's meeting: Thursday 21st March: Michael Rhodes

Michael Rhodes's major work is 'Lion Rampant - Duncan Dunbar and the Age of Sail'. Born in New Zealand, but one would rather describe him as a citizen of the world: educated in Apia, Samoa, then Wellington College, then migrated to Australia in 1966 where he graduated in Law at Sydney University. Then took an interest in writing about Duncan Dunbar, and travelled to the UK, where he was able to get access to some rather rare photos and records in Dunbar's handwriting.

There are multiple categories (including on publishing), with links, below which you will find sub-links...
